# A world without registrars-Follow-up



Last month's feature article was entitled <u>A</u> world without registrars. We asked for feedback and here is one professional's thoughts.

Looking back over four decades of being in this noble profession of higher education, and specifically in "registrar-related work," I have several thoughts which come to mind as I read this article. I should add that I've had the good fortune of meeting Rodney (Dr. Park) on a few occasions, and have had some email correspondence as well. He is a consummate professional, and so reading his thoughts should make us ALL pause.

First, when I am asked to describe just what the role of the registrar is, I over-simplify and say three things: (1) Students are recruited, admitted, provided financial assistance if needed, and establish ways to clear fees and meet the financial obligation...then term after term, registrars take over, clear through graduation and into their role as alumni. (2) Registrars will for the most part have as strong a presence as she or he establishes herself or himself...yes, the ebb and flow of "making the class" may make that climb for resources and visibility a bit cloudier, but we need to put ourselves and our offices "out there." (3) Our profession provides the primary academic affairs support - from A to Z - admission assistance clear through graduating with zest at Commencement or in our now-standard "stuffing of the diplomas and transcript" process at Miami University.

Second, I just completed my tenth anniversary as University Registrar at Miami University, having the privilege to be at Miami-Middletown in a director's role overseeing registration, records, and academic advising, followed by University Registrar at both Xavier University and Wright State University, before returning to my alma mater Miami in 2006. Along the way I believe I have not said "no" to change, however have had to often say "no, not now - put that on the bucket list as a to-do" especially in the last decade of shrinking resources.



Third, I firmly believe that the ROLE of a registrar will always exist, but having consulted at an institution with one of the results being eliminating the TITLE of registrar, our profession must more firmly hold on to the WHAT of our role and less to the TITLE under which we perform those roles. How many of our peers now have a blended title e.g., AVP and Registrar? How many of our peers have seen silos diminished (academic records are viewed by so many offices) and perhaps even eliminated? How many institutions now have student success initiatives whereby the registrar is now part of a retention effort? (Miami has had "Student Success" in OACRAO President Carol Jones' title for years!...before it became so fashionable.)

Fourth, one of my favorite mantras still hails from my Xavier days in the 1990's, though I've expanded it a bit: my role, indeed everyone's role in higher education, is to help recruit, retain, and graduate students...one student at a time. Although I am removed from most day-to-day student contact, my business card and office website contain the email which comes right to me, and the phone number which comes right to my desk. Due to an awesome staff my phone does not ring often, and challenging situations rarely rise to my attention, but whomever calls/emails me is often surprised to "reach me" or even "have me return an email or phone call."

What does all this mean?...on a daily basis I interject "me" into our office responsibilities, in our divisional conversation (Enrollment Management and Student Success), and across the University (as a University Senator). At my request of University Senate Executive Committee several years ago, one of our office staff is assigned to every significant committee/project in order to "inform the discussion" and represent all who WE represent: students, faculty, staff, alumni, and the community. Often we are exofficio but ALWAYS we play a key role...so our actions will preserve our continued role in the successes of Miami University.

Yes, we may still have a typewriter (which I have never used); yes, we still have paper processes to eliminate (those are on the bucket list); yes, I will continue to remind us to look at both internal staff for promotion as well as bring some outside talent in (and not everyone will have been in the registrar field); finally, I will continue to insure we are "at the table" and looking out for the good of the institution, as we play a primary role in preserving the integrity of our institution and all of education.

To quote a seasonal favorite, "Yes, Virginia, there is a registrar, who lives in the mainstream of education." So call me the University Registrar, or call me by another title, but at least call me to continue the vital role that we play...if I haven't called you already!

P.S. After writing this I went to the local YMCA where I ended up talking to the staff member on duty...and connected her with an advisor at Miami so she can pursue the MA in Teaching. "One at a time" strikes again!
