
I'm looking forward to working with each of you this year, listening and learning about your professional development needs. Please feel free to contact me or any Board Member with thoughts and suggestions.

Recently there have been some changes to our website, most significant of which is the website address change to www.ohioaacrao.org. Also, after many years of dedicated service as our webmaster, Deb Benton stepped down. This not only meant that a new webmaster was needed, but also that a new host would be needed as Deb's home institution, Ohio University, had generously hosted our website since its creation. OACRAO's Board of Directors researched various options and it was decided to move to a third party web host to better facilitate any future website transitions and to be less reliant on our member

Private Institution Registrar's Meeting

On Friday, March 14, Mount Vernon Nazarene University hosted the annual Private Institution Registrar's Meeting. We had a record 27 attendees representing 17 different institutions:

Mel Severns served as host and facilitator. Topics of discussion included winter commencement/congratulatory dinners, diploma printing (in-house vs. Jostens), document imaging, course levels, graduation/registration late fees, summer schedules, and IPEDS ethnicity forms.

We also had some lively conversations about the senior to sophomore initiative, increased need for remedial math courses, homeland security requests, and internal enrollment reporting.

A comment was made to alert AACRAO to the problems that Ohio private institutions are having with Governor Strickland's favoritism towards public institutions. Are they aware of it and how can they help?

There was some serious concern expressed that math has become the #1 inhibitor of graduation. High school students who are admitted with high GPA's cannot pass entrance exams. Everyone in attendance has seen a huge increase in the number of remedial courses being offered at the college level. Due to their science requirements at Mercy College, if a student fails MATH 098 twice, they're dismissed. Ashland University has a math logic component (a quantitative course in Chemistry or Economics can fulfill their requirement). Mount Vernon requires math tutoring. B-W is using ALEKS as their on-line test, and Capital University is in the process of instituting one as well.

Overall, we had a very productive day sharing information, comparing notes and socializing with our peers! Mel did a wonderful job organizing the meeting and offered to host it again next year.

OACRAO Board adopts conflict of interest policy

As a follow up to OACRAO's incorporation, the Board of Directors has adopted a conflict of interest policy for the organization. The policy, a requirement for our non-profit status, also puts us in a good position with new regulations the state or federal government may introduce.

The basic premise of the policy is that if a member of the organization or board member has an interest in a business that OACRAO may be considering doing business with, that the member will not participate in either the discussion or vote related to that decision.

Looking back on an incredibly busy week at the AACRAO annual meeting in Orlando, a few experiences really stand out. Any concerns I had about making connections at a conference of over 3,000 people were quickly dispelled by the first time attendee orientation session on Monday afternoon. The round table discussions at this session immediately touched on challenges that we are facing in our daily operations. Between this session and a preconference workshop, by the end of the first day, I had interacted with attendees from a surprising range of locations, from California to Maine, Barbados to Qatar.

The general session speakers were inspiring and the range of offerings for the professional development sessions was impressive. Rarely have I attended a meeting where two or even three sessions in each time slot were directly relevant to me. Luckily, presentation slides and handouts for many of the sessions are available on the AACRAO website. I volunteered to facilitate a session, through which I made a few good contacts for guidance on institutional research questions. In turn, I was able to offer advice and make some referrals for help with semester conversion concerns.

The AACRAO leadership did an excellent job of giving this large conference an intimate feel. Like the sessions at our OACRAO annual meeting, most focused on practical solutions for common problems. I also ran into many familiar OACRAO faces. The extraordinary scope of the expo was the most obvious difference. The true test of a successful meeting? I returned energized, if not quite enthusiastic, for the beginning of summer and fall registration.

FIRST: It's an excuse to get away from the office! Should you feel guilty about that? Absolutely not! There's nothing more refreshing than learning that other colleagues around the country are struggling with the same challenges as you. Some have even found solutions to share. This realization brings you back to the office with a whole new sense of energy and optimism.

SECOND: There are many opportunities to learn. An AACRAO program is very similar to those you've seen at OACRAO, it's just larger and broader. Hints for those thinking of attending their first national meeting:

Make your hotel reservations early. The rooms disappear fast.

Register early to assure the lowest registration rate.

Get to the popular sessions early to get a seat. These would include FERPA and any session on a current (HOT) topic.

Check out the tour options offered at most conference sites.

For veteran conference attendees, it's always good to volunteer at the conference:

Help out at the registration desk

Ask anyone who has attended an AACRAO meeting – it's well worth the investment in time and money.

In memoriam Former Ohio State University Registrar Passes Away

Dean Oscar Clark, Ph.D., age 81, passed away April 1, 2008, at his home in Upper Arlington, Ohio. Dean was born at home in Freeport, Ohio on February 20, 1927. He was the valedictorian of his class at Freeport High School. After graduation, Dean worked for Hercules Motors until he was old enough to serve in the U.S. Army in 1945. He served as a Technical Sergeant and was stationed in Yokohama, Japan as part of the U.S. occupation force at the end of World War II, and

was honorably discharged in 1946. He attended The Ohio State University where he earned the degrees of Bachelor of Science in Education, cum laude, in 1949, Master of Arts in 1950, and Doctor of Philosophy in 1956. Dean worked as a Teacher in Xenia, Ohio, a High School Principal in Ada, Ohio and Newcomerstown, Ohio, Dean of the Department of Education at Heidelberg University in Tiffin, Ohio, Director of Certification for the State of Ohio Department of Education, Registrar for The Ohio State University from 1964-1973, and Director of Admissions and Records for Edison Community College in Fort Myers, Florida. He was a Substitute Teacher for Upper Arlington, Hilliard, and Wellington Schools. He served as Chairman of the Membership and Inspection Committee of the Ohio College Association from 1971-1974. His articles on education were published in more than 30 newspapers, magazines, and educational journals.
