SIS Testing – Trick or Treat



Book Summary: As the commercialization of American higher education accelerates, more and more students are coming to college with the narrow aim of obtaining a preprofessional credential. The traditional four-year college experience--an exploratory time for students to discover their passions and test ideas and values with the help of teachers and peers--is in danger of becoming a thing of the past. The author explains the history of college education and then mounts a vigorous defense of a broadly humanistic education for all. Acknowledging the serious financial, intellectual, and ethical challenges that all colleges face today, Delbanco considers what is at stake in the urgent effort to protect these venerable institutions for future generations.

THURSDAY NIGHT CONFERENCE EVENTS

Dayton Art Institute

Did you know that one of the top art museums in the country was in Dayton? The Dayton Institute of Art is one of the top rated museums and was rated one of the top 10 art museums for children. Sitting atop a hill overlooking the city, the museum itself is a work of art but it also houses a number of significant pieces.



Built in 1930, the building is in the Italian Renaissance style and overlooks Dayton and the conference hotel.

The museum has extensive collections in the areas of African art, American art, European, Asian and Ancient and in mediums from glass to oil to sculpture. There are more than 26,000 items in the institute's

permanent collection spanning over 5,000 years.



One of the museum's most significant paintings is High Noon by Edward Hopper.

The interior of the building is as breathtaking as the exterior with both a Gothic style cloister and an Italian style cloister, great hall, and rotunda all of which feature a distinctive style and look.

Conference attendees will have an opportunity on Thursday evening to tour the Dayton Art Institute.



The painting Waterlillies by Claude Monet, one of the most recognizable paintings Impressionist paintings in the world has been part of the collection at the DAI since 1953.

Dayton Masonic Center

The Dayton Masonic Center was built beginning in 1925 and is one of the larger facilities in Dayton.

Similar in function to the Masonic Hall that can be found in most communities around the country, the Dayton Masonic Center differs because more than a dozen Masonic organizations regularly meet in the building. Because of the history and beauty of the building, most of the events that take place in the building today are Dayton area community events including plays and concerts. The center is also the most popular yet exclusive place to hold your wedding reception in Dayton.

The Masons are a fraternal organization whose history dates back to the 16th century and in the United States dates back to the founding fathers

including George Washington and Benjamin Franklin. Known mostly for their charity work the ceremony and legend of the organization traces its roots back to stonemasons.

OACRAO will have its Thursday night dinner at the Dayton Masonic Center (next door to the Dayton Art Institute) and guided tours of the facility will be available.

Update from the Ohio Board of Regents

The Articulation and Transfer Clearinghouse is a computer system administered by the Ohio Board of Regents that allows the public colleges and universities to exchange electronic transcripts for free. This past year there was a large effort put forth to get all of the University System of Ohio (USO) schools connected so they may take advantage of the benefits of this system. This effort resulted in some noteworthy statistics for the ATC in 2011.

15 USO schools got connected to the ATC in 2011 in order to exchange electronic transcripts!

10 out of those 15 schools that got connected to the ATC are in 100% compliance utilizing the ATC's automated web services

34, 827 transcripts were sent through the ATC in 2011 o

This is a 56% increase from the previous year and the largest year-to-year increase since the ATC has been up and running

At the end of 2011:

25 of 36 (69%) Institutions were 100% implemented using web services

33 of 36 (92%) Institutions are using web services to either send or receive transcripts

32 of 36 (89%) Institutions are using either web services or manually sending and receiving transcripts

She contacted the web service providers and found out how we could get a 25% discount on our web services! The Executive Board of OACRAO voted to prepay our site for two years at the cost of 18 months. A big shout of thanks to Connie for saving our organization money!

While it may be a little difficult to read it provides an interesting glimpse back to our past and provides information on the beginnings of this organization. It is interesting to note that many of the topics which were discussed at early meetings are still being discussed today!

A Summary of the History of . . .

The Ohio Association of Collegiate

The history of the Association dates back to the early 1920's. Lawrence C. Underwood, former registrar at Hiram, noted while he was Chairman of the Historian's Committee, that registrars from six Ohio colleges met in 1922. Thomas E. Steckel of Ohio Wesleyan University had charge of the meeting. While Mr. Underwood in his notes mentions other informal meetings, neither he, nor any of the records of the Association give information on meetings taking place.

A serious effort was made to organize a state association in 1925. In that year Miss L. Bernice Garritt, Registrar of the College for Women of Western Reserve University, sent letters to registrars throughout Ohio. The replies which she received were favorable to a meeting and possible organization. She then arranged with her colleague at Western Reserve, Sidney S. Wilson, Treasurer of Western Reserve and President of the Ohio College Treasurers, to meet with his group in Akron, May 5-6, 1926. It was from this meeting that the first formal organization was founded and officers were elected. Minutes of that meeting read: . . . "the organization should invite to membership all registrars of Ohio colleges, irrespective of the grade of the institution, and that examiners also be included in the membership". Miss Garritt was elected president and Fred E. Nessell, Registrar of Hiram College, as secretary. They were to serve for one year. The new organization was called the Association of Ohio College Registrars and Examiners.

The first full professional meeting was held in Cleveland, November 19-20, 1926. With twenty-six institutions represented by forty-four individuals the success of the organization was assured. The program of this first meeting included formal papers on topics which have been repeated at the annual meetings from time to time, although under different headings — the value of a state association of Ohio registrars, the necessary equipment of a registrar's office, the registrar's responsibilities and opportunities, the registrar in the field of administration, basis of selective choosing of applicants from high school, and the evaluation of irregular credits. The host institution for the first meeting in 1926 provided a complimentary dinner to the Association members.

While the admission officers were, and have always been represented in the Association, they decided in the thirties to form their own organization. As a result our organization changed its name in 1938 to the

legistrars and Admissions Officers

Association of Ohio College Registrars. Thirty years later in 1968 the name was again changed to its present form, the Ohio Association of Collegiate Registrars and Admission Officers.

The Association grew and prospered during the late twenties, the thirties and the forties. Therefore, it is not surprising to note that the Association held its Silver Jubilee Meeting in 1950 in Cleveland at John Carroll University. Three other Cleveland institutions, Case Institute of Technology, Fenn College and Western Reserve University, shared the host responsibilities. Like the first meeting, this one began with a complimentary steak dinner. The program indicated that the interests of the members were similar to those of the first meeting — the registrar and the admission officer, the registrar as a general administrative officer, tests and examinations. A question box period was a part of the program. Forty-six institutions were listed as members.

Since 1950 the Association has continued to grow in member institutions, professional stature, and in contributions made to the national organization as would be expected by noting the purpose as stated in the present Constitution originally adopted in 1956:

The purpose of this Association shall be to provide, by means of annual conferences and otherwise, for the spread of information and interchange of ideas on problems of common interest; to foster a friendly spirit of unity and cooperation among its members; to assist in any way possible the registrars and admissions officers of newly created institutions of higher education; and to promote a spirit of professional pride.

Two members have served the AACRAO as president, Robert E. Mahn of Ohio University and Garland G. Parker of the University of Cincinnati. Many others have been contributors to a wide range of committees, to publications, and as participants at the national meeings. Equally important to all members, new and old in the organization, has been the friendship among all members, and the sincere interest to be helpful to each other, the varied programs at the annual meetings, and the workshops to provide new expertise for the members. Today the Ohio Association of Collegiate Registrars and Admissions Officers includes eighty institutions represented by over two hundred seventy-five individuals.

Baldwin-Wallace College will become Baldwin Wallace University effective July 1, 2012. The Board of Trustees believes that the new name will more accurately reflect B-**W**'s current structure and program offerings as well as the institution that is emerging for tomorrow.

Robert C. Helmer, president of Lourdes University in Sylvania, Ohio, has been named the ninth president of Baldwin-Wallace College. The appointment is effective July 1, 2012. He will succeed Richard W. Durst, the Baldwin-Wallace president since 2006, who retires June 30.

Noted for academic quality across its curriculum, Baldwin-Wallace College is a vibrant institution serving approximately 3,000 full-time undergraduates, 600 part-time students in evening/weekend programs and more than 700 graduate students in education and business. Its Conservatory of Music is internationally renowned.

Federal Roundup......

Scorecard on Colleges and University

A big focus of the President's recent State of the Union speech was college affordability. One of the newest initiatives to come out of the White House is a "College Scorecard". The scorecard would collect a series of data points for all colleges and universities in one place so students and families could begin comparing a set of consistent statistics on the schools they are choosing from. The tool would provide information about an institution's cost, graduation rate, average debt burden, loan-repayment rate, and job-placement rate.

Federal Budget Notes

A draft version of the federal budget was released last week. Higher Education was a significant focus of the draft specifically the areas of teaching prep, job training, and quality and affordability. Some examples held in the proposal includes doubling funding for Work-Study over the next five years, Pell funding of \$36.1 billion (Pell maximum will be set at \$5,635). Also included was an extension of the American Opportunity Tax Credit (would have expired later this year) and a series of accountability and affordability initiatives including the College Scorecard.

Department of Defense MOU Update

Progress is still being made in the rewrite of the MOU. DoD officials have been meeting for the past month with higher education representatives including AACRAO to discuss concerns and with help in preparing a new draft.

Stay tuned for more updates in the coming months. A new version isn't expected for at least a month and there will likely be an opportunity for an AACRAO preview shortly before. Because of the timing, this will be a major topic at AACRAO's annual meeting.

2012 OACRAO Conference Sessions

If you attended the OACRAO conference at Deer Creek last year, you'll recognize some of the great sessions we are planning again for this year! We had tremendous success with our Book Club, Bright Ideas and Debate sessions.

We have presenters lined up to cover several new topics: RN Programs (a first for OACRAO hosted by the VP of Healthcare Education Initiatives from CCC), Social Networking, SIS Testing: Trick or Treat?, Understanding First Generation Students, and Title IV Regulations among others. We will also have some panel discussions, exhibitor sessions and new member programs.

There is sure to be something for everyone whether you work in the office of Registration or Admissions! We learn a lot from each other so please plan on bringing your experiences to share in the discussion.

Ohio Articulation and Transfer Network (OATN) Meeting Update

On May 3rd, the Board of Regents held the Ohio Articulation and Transfer Network (OATN). The meeting was attended by a number of OACRAO members from Admissions and Registrar Offices. While the focus audience was public institutions, a number of private institutions also attended in order to learn more about the initiatives.

Ohio e-Transcript Project

ODE explained that the new SSID will be created when a student enters the public K-12 school system. That should be a data element that is shared on the electronic transcripts from high schools to colleges. ODE is confirming with schools the expectation that the SSID is communicated.

One of the most significant concerns raised is that public high schools are not required to participate. The concern among the attendees was that until a critical mass of Ohio schools participated, it was not worthwhile making an investment in the technology needed to support the initiative.

Look for future communications and summits on this topic.

Articulation and Transfer Clearinghouse

The meeting provided an opportunity for schools to share feedback with OBOR on the ATC. There was an over-whelming response from our constituents that those who have been connected to the ATC for a considerable amount of time are ready to go paperless. OBOR is verifying which institutions would like to go paperless in order to post that information on their website.

Beyond compliance with the existing mandate, schools who have already gone paperless expressed concerns that they were forced to maintain duplicate systems to support those not in compliance and felt as if they have been penalized for complying while others had not. Even though they have complied, they have not been able to fully take advantage of savings and efficiencies expected (because of supporting communication with schools who have not gone paperless).

OBOR will be working on developing a strategy for all schools to go paperless and is developing an ATC steering committee to work on governance issues.

Importing XML Transcripts

OACRAO and OBOR will be co-sponsoring a working summit for schools to learn more about importing the XML data into their student database to save data entry and to create a more efficient process. Schools who have done this successfully will share their strategies. The target audience will be both operations staff and technical or systems support staff.



Treasurer's Report

Another tax year is over and all of the non-profit taxes are filed for both IRS and the state of Ohio. Speaking of another year, it's is almost time for OACRAO dues. This year Jack Miner and I are working with a solution that will allow dues to be paid by credit card! Stay Tuned!
